Wouter Quackenbosch purchased property outside the north gate of Albany in 1676. In 1683 he purchased additional land in the same area, lying between "the Third and Fourth kills," paying 58 whole beavers and one half beaver. Which kills, or streams, are signified as the third and fourth is not certain, making it difficult to pinpoint the location of the property. It is possible that the land included the site of the "Quackenbush House" at the corner of the present Broadway and Quackenbush streets (see page 73).

Wouter and his wife, Neeltje, are named as members of the Reformed Dutch Church of Albany in 1683. Wouter probably continued his father's brick business, as he is mentioned in the Reformed Dutch Church Annals among "those who furnished materials for the Dominie's [minister's] house" in 1703.

Reynier and his first wife, Lysbeth, probably settled in Albany shortly after their marriage in New York City in 1674. They are listed as members of the Reformed Dutch Church of Albany in 1683. Lysbeth died sometime after the baptism of their son, Claas, in 1689, but before Reynier remarried in 1692.

Reynier, along with his brother, Johannes (q.v.), was one of the original settlers of the Canastagione Patent on the north bank of the Mohawk River. By 1692 he was in New York City, where he married his second wife and where the rest of his children were baptized. Reynier probably never returned to Canastagione, although he continued to own land there. He is listed as a constable in the Bowery Division of New York City in 1700 and 1701.

According to a long-standing tradition in the Quackenbush family, one of the early Quackenbush women and her infant child were killed by the Indians. It is possible that this legend refers to Reynier's first wife, Lysbeth, and their son Claas baptized in 1689. Although Lysbeth and Claas are not listed among the victims of the terrible Schenectady massacre of 1690, they could have been killed in any one of a similar number of raids along the Mohawk during this period.

According to the *Iconography of Manhattan Island*, Reynier's farm in New York City was located in lower Manhattan Island in the vicinity of today's Union Square on 14th Street between Broadway and Sixth Avenue and down to 10th Street.

Reynier probably died in New York City, sometime between the date of the Canastagione patent, 20 Apr. 1708, and 25 Aug. 1711, when his widow, Claesje, married the widower Jacob Koning at the Reformed Dutch Church of New York City. Jacob Koning and Claesje had two children, Aaltje and Isaac, both baptized at the New York Reformed Dutch Church.
